

Australia is a vast continent and those living as far away as Sydney or Brisbane will have flown almost as far as from another continent. Therefore a special thanks must go to all who travelled from within Australia as well as to those who flew in from New Zealand [the Dudins and Paula Burch], from England, [Sue Crane [Hitchcox], David and Grant Daniels], from Kenya, Jay and Julie [Robinson] Roffey and Peter Gerrard from the Islands. Eddie writes that there will have been over 200 Kenyans present at the function. Unfortunately Perth was too distant but greetings are sent to all nevertheless.

We were all saddened to hear of the sudden death of **Biddy Crowcombe** in February. Biddy celebrated her 85th Birthday in January of 2003. She had to undergo abdominal surgery from which she never really recovered. As with George Brooks, I had asked a few who knew Biddy really well to pen some thoughts for the Newsletter. **Clare** [Breckenridge] Long wrote: 'I tried several times but I just couldn't do it – perhaps because we became friends once I was an adult and I could not write about her simply as a teacher from the past.' [*Clare, I know exactly how you will have felt and in one simple sentence you actually said it all. To those who kept in touch with Biddy over the years she became a friend*].

Dee Rayner probably knew Biddy as well as any of her past pupils and she wrote: '**Biddy Crowcombe** died earlier this month in Derriford Hospital, Plymouth. She was a born [and gifted] teacher, although often terrifying to those who had not yet reached her class. Of my year, I think I was one of the first to detect a human face behind the glittering spectacle lenses and the frequent refrain of, "You horrible little girl / boy!"

'It was only years later that I discovered that Biddy had stood as guarantor for my improved behaviour when the Head, exasperated by my particularly vile phase of testing the parameters of rebellion, intended to eject me from Kitale School. Realising that much of my disruptive behaviour was due to boredom she set up a programme that was both challenging and enjoyable, thus turning negative energies into positive. When I wrote to her about this, Biddy dismissed it as "just a question of guiding you in the right direction and ignoring your little foibles," – a prime understatement.'

'Mary MacDonald, [Spots], the Senior Girls' Housemistress who later married **Ron MacDonald** gave a probably well-merited detention one Saturday to myself and several others. Ways and means of evading this were discussed, none likely of success. At last an inspiration – I would ask Biddy for a detention, knowing full well that an academic detention would override a dormitory one. "She'll never do it," said the others, but she did, bless her. She gave us tea at her house and then sat us down to read "mind improving books" for the duration whilst we, unthinking, left her to handle ruffled staff feathers elsewhere. Biddy was obviously amused by the sheer gall of the request.

'Biddy's aim with the blackboard rubber was unerring. There was nothing like a direct strike to bring the inattentive back to the lesson of the moment with a sharp jolt.

'Biddy and my parents remained close, lifelong friends; they adored her straight talking and her laconic humour. Biddy expected the best, whether leading from the front, pushing from behind or both. As is the way of the world, many of us failed to realise until much later the influence she had on our lives. Rest in peace, Biddy; you ran a wonderful race.'

[I think we would all add an "Amen" to that, Dee. Thank you].

Our thoughts and sympathy go out to you, **Chris**, in the loss of a colleague and good friend of so many years, first in Kitale and later in Devon.

'I finally made the break from Kenya in 1998 and moved to Brazil to work for an American company, constructing hospitals. On my arrival in Curitiba, a city south of Sao Paulo, I found that all my luggage was missing and a friendly Brazilian woman offered to translate for me. Little did we know that this was the start of a lifetime for us as she is now my wife, **Lucirene**. After four glorious years in Brazil, we decided to move back to the UK. The Brazilian economy is descending to an all-time low and we want to give my adopted daughter a better education.

I got to know Adrian and his parents well during that time as I was asked to help bridge the gap in his maths. He used to come to my cottage just near the entrance to the school in his Eagle Tee shirt which, like all boarding school clothing, had faded and been stretched at the neck so hung loose. We lost touch until we met many years later in Mombasa, when I first got to know Jacquelien and then those of you who were at the Reunion in November 2003 will have seen both Adrian and Jacquelien at the Muthaiga Club. [Our hearts go out to Jacquelien, Kevin and Brita as well as to Freda in Croydon, England and Andrew and Gail in Perth, Australia.]

Diana [Fulton] Purchase let us know that her friend during her time both at Kitale School and Highlands Eldoret, **Topsy Parsons**, died of cancer in Australia. Topsy was Captain of Kestrel at the same time as Diana captained Hawk House.

On a more cheerful note, Diana celebrated her 60th birthday by flying to Singapore for three weeks with a friend and it seems that it was a holiday of fun and laughter.
