However, to partner Kitale Academy with a similar school in South Africa whereby the teachers and children could exchange ideas, compare schools, environment, geographical situations such as climate and economics - the list should be endless, is feasible and Bridget has already been in touch with a possible school which is mentored by one of Johannesburg's leading Heads. So much knowledge can be shared through electronic mail and Kitale Academy is blessed with and owns proudly no less than 40 working computers.

Bishop Steven of the Anglican Church also made time during his busy Saturday morning schedule to be with us and even to address the alumni gathering briefly.

Following the addresses, the Staff Choir entertained the audience as did the children, with dancing and singing. Chris Hearne and Cliff Mukulu presented soccer, basket and netballs, which were received with much jubilation. A new book on Madiba, Nelson Mandela, was presented, alongside a fund started through the extreme generosity of Michael Brookes, to which others added lesser sums. The money is to go towards uplifting the school library, with Nigel Warren, in conjunction with Mrs Wanyonye, monitoring spending.

Following on from the formal proceedings, we were offered excellent refreshments in the Thereafter, room. Junior dining members and boys and girls conducted tours of the school before lunch. I believe all who revisited the school would agree with my feelings that the Staff are to be congratulated on a school where, considering the numbers, time management is excellent, the children are disciplined and extremely well-mannered as well as neatly turned out. The curriculum, inevitably is syllabus-bound with, in my view, not enough emphasis on lateral thinking. This is a weakness in many African countries where large classes and necessity for children to pass exams dictates. However, to find even one young man reading Ryder Haggard in Swahili was gratifying. Jane Cox [Nicholson] mentioned how delighted she was to see so many girls in brownie and guide uniforms, this indicating that the extra mural started by her Mum, Margaret, was still going strong. Lunch, like the morning coffee snacks, was an excellent meal after which many went to visit farms while several of us returned to the Club to add finishing touches to the décor for the

Gala Dinner.

Club Committee Many, including the Members were amazed at the transformation of the Conference Centre for the evening. The meal: The main course had been cooked in the Club kitchen while there was an endless, amazing variety of desserts provided by Committee and friends. Well done all and thank you for a huge effort. Invited guests included the Members of the Club Committee, Governors of the School and Senior Staff Members. They all mingled well with the rest of us and a great evening went on into the small hours with lots of photographs taken, music played and dancing enjoyed. Amazingly, albeit perhaps bleary eyed, most appeared the next morning for brunch and farewells on the Club veranda overlooking the golf course. Sunday activities again went on into late afternoon and evening for those who did not have to leave. It must be mentioned that the swimming pool and golf course are both in pristine condition and a credit to those whose responsibility it is to look after both.

Kenya revisited: I believe all who returned would agree that it remains a great country – both scenically and its people we found to be simply the best.
